A Message From Our Pastor...

That time of year...

Summer means different things to different people. For many, it means special time at the lake or beach, or it may mean vacation travel time. For others, summer is the time to catch up on things put off at busier times of year. Like any other time of year, summer can be over-scheduled and frantic. Or it can be a slower, calmer season of more rest and reflection.

The Church has seasons, too, from Advent and Christmas, to Lent and Easter, to the church's birthday at Pentecost. The time after Pentecost—the longest season, which includes summer—takes us up to Advent again.

To help us keep track of the liturgical calendar and, more importantly, to keep us rooted in God's Word all year, Christian churches of all kinds use a lectionary, which is itself a calendar or schedule of Bible readings for the whole year.

Lectionaries have a long history, dating back to at least the fourth century. The Jewish people read from a lectionary that takes them through every verse of the Torah (Genesis-Deuteronomy) every year. Roman Catholics and Orthodox Christians use lectionaries specific to their historic traditions.

Today most Protestant denominations use the **Revised Common Lectionary** (RCL). The lectionary provides four Scripture readings for each Sunday's worship: an Old Testament reading, a Psalm, a gospel reading, and a reading from Acts or the rest of the New Testament. The RCL is organized in three-year cycles. Year A features the Gospel of Matthew; Year B, Mark; and Year C, Luke. Readings from John's gospel are scheduled every year, mostly during the Christmas and Easter seasons.

During this season of transition to new pastoral leadership at First Pres, most Sundays we will be using the lectionary to organize and focus our worship. This is Year C, so this summer we are on the road with Jesus making his way to Jerusalem, as recounted in the Gospel of Luke. Come to worship at 9:00 or 11:00 each week to hear all about it!

I look forward to these many weeks together. Thank you for the many kind expressions of support and encouragement as together we embark on this interim journey.

You are on the front lines for your children every day shaping them to one day be responsible adults. First Pres is your partner in this journey!


One way we want to help nurture our children is by teaching them about **prayer**. This is a beautiful skill that will last them a lifetime in good and hard times.







Imagine what life would be like if you had PERFECT faith.


In this video-based Bible study, pastor and best-selling author Andy Stanley builds a biblical case for five things God uses to grow BIG faith.



Pastor Search Process Explanation

The weeks and months ahead stand to be exciting as First Pres searches for its next called and installed pastor. Here's how the process will go.

When Kyle accepted another call in late May, he notified Session leadership and Trinity Presbytery's Commission on Ministry (COM). On June 1, the Session formally accepted Kyle's resignation and agreed to pursue the possibility of Brad Christie leading the church through the transition period. To date, Session leaders have met with Brad to discuss the succession plan, and COM has appointed moderator Gina Brinson as liaison. From this point, the FPC Session will work closely with Gina (pron. "Jenna") through the rest of the process.

The Session is asking COM to approve Brad's serving as interim pastor through the whole search process. Hopefully, that arrangement will be approved at the August 23 presbytery meeting.

COM and the Session will collaborate on a mission study, probably in early fall. This study will produce a clear picture of where the church is now and a vision for moving forward with new pastoral leadership. Once the mission study is completed, the Session, through a special nominating committee, will recommend a Pastor Nominating Committee (PNC) for approval by the congregation.

The PNC will publish a detailed description of the church and its vision. They will then receive and review applications from ministers seeking a call to such a church. Eventually, the PNC will interview a short list of top candidates and confer with COM about terms of call for the new pastor, who will then be presented to the congregation for approval.

The search for a new pastor entails many important steps, which cannot be rushed. The PNC will consult with COM throughout the process and report regularly to the congregation. The entire process typically takes at least a year to 18 months to complete.

Clearly, we need to keep this whole transitional season in fervent, concerted prayer! God is good. And God has good things in store for FPC. Thanks be to God!

FROM TRINITY PRESBYTERY....

When a pastoral position with a congregation ends, there are bonds of affection between the minister and members of the church that continue to be cherished. Relations of friendship continue, but the pastoral relationship does not. In order to avoid awkward situations and to encourage the new pastoral relationship that will be established, the Presbytery establishes the following guidelines.

When a pastor resigns from a pastorate, retires from service, or becomes pastor Emerita/us, Trinity Presbytery urges that minister to decline invitations such as weddings, baptisms, funerals, hospital visitation or counseling from his/her former congregation members. Active or inactive church members should not request that a former pastor perform pastoral duties. If, in spite of this policy, an invitation is extended or accepted, former pastors, associate pastors and other ministers "shall not provide their pastoral services to members of their former congregation without the invitation of the moderator of the session." G-2.0905. This policy of Trinity Presbytery is intended to help former ministers and the congregations who love them prepare to embrace the next chapter in their lives, and to clear the way for the next installed pastor to minister to the needs of the congregation entrusted to his/her care.

While avoiding participation in any funerals, weddings, baptisms, etc., of former parishioners is difficult, it should be remembered that if the first invitation is accepted, reasons to refuse other requests will be very difficult to substantiate. If the circumstances of the minister's departure make it advisable for the health of the congregation, the Session may elect to allow the departing pastor to perform any weddings that were approved prior to the Pastor's resignation/announcement of retirement. However, baptisms, funerals, weddings planned following the pastor's announcement of departure, and other pastoral duties should be refused by the departing pastor.

MONTHLY MISSION SPOTLIGHT Project Linus

Project Linus has made blanket deliveries to two summer camps for children with special needs. Nine BLANKETEERS traveled to Columbia, to Camp Cole to give 120 homeless children their blankets. These children live in shelters or are in foster care. They were so excited to be at camp!



We each met with the children assigned to a particular cottage and told them about Linus. You can see the camp counselors carrying the bags of blankets for us to each cottage. It is always so rewarding to watch the children look over all the blankets and make their choice... some know right away and others have to try them on and struggle to decide. They can't believe that they can take the blankets with them at the end of camp, and the Camp Director later told us they were so proud to show them to their caregivers when they were picked up at the end of camp.

In June, BLANKETEERS from our support group in McCormick gave 47 blankets to youngsters at a camp for children with autism. This was a new camp for us and we were so pleased that we were able to serve them this summer, as well.

Your support through the Missions and Outreach Team makes a big difference to what we are able to do, not just through camps, but all year long, to the 28 agencies in the 5 counties we serve, as well as to individual children we learn about. BLANKETEERS donate their time, materials and amazing talent, but we are all encouraged to know that this church values their efforts with financial support. Thank you.

God has placed a vision on our hearts to build a Technical Training Center for youth on the use of brick kilns. We believe every young person deserves a chance to learn a skill, dream a new dream, and walk out of slavery into freedom.

We are thankful to share that land has already been donated for this center! This is a huge step forward, and we are filled with hope. Now, we are praying and trusting God for the resources needed to construct the building. Church History for the Month: The Pastors of our Church: James W. Johnson

This month, we will pick up in our series of entries on the pastors of our church, highlighting the ministry of the seventh pastor of our church, Rev. James W. Jackson, who came to our church in December of 1926.1 Rev. Jackson arrived at our church on the heels of a very fruitful season of growth for our church, one that included the construction of our education building in 1924. When our previous minister, Rev. MacLean, accepted a call to Ginter Park Presbyterian Church in Richmond, Virginia in April 1926, our church immediately began searching for our next pastor.² By September of that year, our church extended a call to Rev. James W. Jackson, who was then serving the First Presbyterian Church of Tallahassee, Florida.³ Rev. Jackson arrived in Greenwood in December and was formally welcomed to Green-

wood in an evening union service on Sunday, December 5, which also welcomed the newly arrived Rev. William H. Garrett, the new pastor at Main Street Methodist.⁴ The welcoming service, hosted by our church, is described as one of "the largest that has ever attended a church service in Greenwood." Rev. Jackson was officially installed as the pastor of our church on Sunday, January 9, 1927, with our sixth pastor, Rev. J. B. Green, to deliver the sermon for the installation service.5

During his time as the pastor of our church, Rev. Jackson became a very well-known speaker and was invited to give a variety of addresses to various organizations in the community, beginning with an address given to the cadets of the Bailey Military Institute in May 1927.6 In 1930, Rev. Jackson received a Doctor of Divinity degree from Presbyterian College and was selected to deliver their commencement address during the spring commencement exercises.⁷ During his time in Greenwood, Dr. Jackson was also elected as the president of the Greenwood Kiwanis Club.8 Dr. Jackson served our church for just over four years. On January 18, 1931, he announced his resignation as the pastor of our church, having accepted a call to serve as the pastor of First Presbyterian Church of Columbia, S.C.9

Today, our church is in a period of transition, very similar to the time prior to Dr. Jackson's arrival in Greenwood and shortly after his departure for Columbia. As we begin the search process for our next senior minister, let us be encouraged by knowing that our church has navigated similar times before and, more importantly, observing that God has taken care of our church in the past. Let us continue to pray for Pastor Kyle's ministry in Florida, and for the future ministry of the next pastor that God is bringing to our church.

I don't know about you, but I get so excited about those moments of the year that offer a new start. Sometimes it's the beginning of a new year. Other times, it's the summer, where families get a fresh experience of spending time together. In other cases, it's the fall, where the school calendar picks back up in August and everyone gets their binders, notebooks, and bookbags, ready to discover what a brand-new school year holds. Sometimes my birthday feels like a fresh start, or simply the changing of the seasons...those first warm spring days when the flowers start blooming or those first crisp days of fall.

These moments in our yearly calendar remind me that God always gives us a fresh start, but also that He loves us enough to keep moving us forward from where we once were like we talked about Phil. 1:6. He's never just repeating the same season over again with nothing to show for it. Instead, He's always moving us onward and upward, transforming us into the image of His Son, even when it doesn't feel like it. He promises that the "old you" has gone - who we once were apart from Christ isn't how God sees us anymore - and that the new creation, the person we were always meant to be, is now here because of Jesus. And more than that, we keep becoming more and more like Him over time. I love that He is continuously making us new and loving us into the best version of ourselves.

Grateful for the reminder that we are new creations. We aren't the "old" us anymore! No matter how loud lies might be that say otherwise, God's Word speaks a louder Word. If anything or anyone tries to tell us different, let's see these fighting words today: the old has gone, the new has come!

- When do you most often need the reminder that the "old you" is not how God sees you anymore? How might you help yourself remember the truth of this verse in those moments?
